DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT Sharon Phelps

It all began in Austin, Texas, on a bright summer day—July 14, 2024—when Sharon D. Phelps was duly elected the 104th President of the American Legion Auxiliary, Department of Texas. The joy, humility, and honor she felt standing before the convention body marked the first moment of a yearlong journey of service, advocacy, and connection. Her promise was simple but powerful: to honor the trust placed in her by giving nothing but her very best.

With 25 years of faithful service to the American Legion Auxiliary at Austin Reed Unit 84 in Madisonville, Texas, Sharon brought not only experience but also heart. Inspired by her father's service in the U.S. Air Force, she dedicated her year to "Advocating for Change... One Veteran at a Time." Her special project, PTSD Camp Hope in Houston, served as a beacon of that mission. A haven for healing and support, Camp Hope provides no-cost housing, counseling, and mentorship for veterans and their families, addressing a deeply personal and national need. And then, like a butterfly beginning its flight, her travels began...

Sharon's first official appearance came at the American Legion Baseball Tournament in League City, where she was honored to throw out the ceremonial first pitch. A celebratory dinner at Post 554 followed, where she brought greetings on behalf of the Department of Texas and congratulated the talented teams in the playoffs. This beloved tradition marked the beginning of her travels as President.

Upon returning from a weekend of budget planning at the beginning of August, Sharon was touched by an unexpected celebration organized by her Legion Family—complete with shrimp Alfredo, salad, cake, crown, and sash. For one night, she was Queen Sharon, wrapped in love and appreciation. The laughter, hugs, and surprise reflected the heart of the Auxiliary. Like butterflies drawn to warmth, members came together to lift her up and celebrate the spirit of unity and transformation that she brought to every encounter.

In mid-August, Sharon attended the celebration of life for Past Department and National President Katherine Morris. It was a heartfelt moment honoring a leader whose legacy continues to flutter through the lives she touched—much like the enduring path of a butterfly in flight.



In late August, Sharon proudly represented Texas at the National Convention of the American Legion Auxiliary in New Orleans. Walking the convention halls, attending national sessions, and exchanging ideas with leaders from every state, she carried the spirit and strength of Texas with her. The experience not only reaffirmed her commitment to the mission of the Auxiliary but also deepened her perspective on the unity and diversity of service across the nation.

At the 13th Annual Spirit of '45 event in League City in early September, Sharon joined in honoring WWII veterans. Mr. Buck, a 100-year-old veteran, delighted the crowd with stories, music, and dance. He and his wife embodied the joy and resilience that mark a life of service—reminding all present that the spirit of patriotism can still dance, sing, and soar like butterflies on a breeze.

During the Fall DEC meeting in late September, budgets were approved, and a "Kaleidoscope of Color" Program Fair launched the year's plans. True to its name, this colorful kickoff reminded us of a butterfly's wings—diverse, vibrant, and beautifully united in purpose.

In early October, Sharon made it to Unit 817 in Beaumont for a leadership class with Past Department President and her Parliamentarian Teresa Copeland, that ended with warm smiles and late-night waffles. Her determination to lead, even when the skies rerouted her plans, echoed the butterfly's unyielding journey toward the light.

At Camilla on the edge of Lake Livingston, Sharon joined the 1st Annual District 7 picnic—a day full of fried chicken, laughter, and a gentle breeze across the water. George, her ever-steady companion, sat peacefully overlooking the lake. It was a perfect moment of stillness and reflection—like watching butterflies float across a sunlit field.

At the 2nd District Convention, Sharon reconnected with old friends and made new ones. It was a reminder that the Auxiliary's impact stretches far beyond meetings and events—it's in every hug, every word, every flutter of kindness.

Just before Thanksgiving, braving the cold, Sharon helped distribute water and fruit during a 5K walk for PTSD awareness. The event, hosted by Unit 33, supported her special project—Camp Hope. As veterans and supporters walked the course, it symbolized progress through resilience, much like the butterfly emerging stronger from the cocoon.



In Killeen, Sharon assisted in distributing 500 bags of Thanksgiving meal fixings to military families. The highlight wasn't just the turkey—it was the teamwork, the smiles, and a special visit from Walker Bush, grandson of President George H. W. Bush. The day was filled with gratitude and grace, a tribute to what can bloom when hearts unite.

December saw many VA Christmas Stores return for the first time since COVID. At VA facilities in Temple, Waco and Dallas, Sharon helped bring holiday cheer. In Waco, Madisonville's Unit 84 donated 75 backpacks and 36 handmade pillows stitched by a 93-year-old woman for female veterans. One pillow featured a butterfly, and it brought tears of joy to the recipient. These were the moments that mattered—small tokens with wings of compassion.

Sharon supported the Operation Comfort Warriors program, which provides nonessential recovery items for wounded veterans. These often-unseen needs are like the silent beauty of a butterfly's wing—unnoticed by most, but transformative to the one who receives it. Despite the rain, over 125 gathered to honor fallen heroes with wreaths in Lufkin on December 14th. Sharon, the guest speaker, received a gift basket adorned with a purple hummingbird feeder and butterfly-themed items. It was a symbol of hope and remembrance—graceful, lasting, and meaningful.

At Mid-Winter in January, Sharon received powerful training and contributed to the Americanism video project, "You're a Grand Old Flag." Shortly after, she faced a medical procedure that paused her travels, but not her spirit. She extended deep thanks to Past Department President Holly Heatly for stepping in for her at the State Oratorical Competition — a reminder that even when the butterfly rests, others continue the flight.

Dozens gathered to roast and honor Sharon at her homecoming in Madisonville at the beginning of December. Surrounded by joy and stories, she was reminded that transformation is best celebrated in the presence of those who walked the journey with you.

As Distinguished Guest Speaker at the 19th District Convention in mid-March, Sharon witnessed a well-run convention and enjoyed a homemade lunch among friends. Leadership was passed on, memories made, and like butterflies, friendships fluttered to new places.



The middle of April meant a special trip to Brenham where Sharon delivered an inspiring talk and shared ice cream sundaes with members. She and her husband George were made to feel at home—a sentiment that follows her wherever she travels.

Sharon attended all four Division Conventions, continuing to spread her message, encourage members, and celebrate their efforts. Each stop was another wingbeat in a year of steady, heartfelt flight.

As Sharon's term as Department President draws to a close, her journey reflects a metamorphosis—one marked by service, compassion, and a deep-rooted commitment to our veterans and their families. Like the butterfly, a symbol of transformation and quiet strength, Sharon has touched lives in delicate yet powerful ways across the state of Texas. Her leadership was gentle but powerful an emblem of resilience, beauty, and quiet strength.

Her theme, "Advocating for Change... One Veteran at a Time," resonated not only through her actions but also in the hearts of those she inspired. Every stop she made, every hand she shook, and every speech she delivered planted seeds of encouragement that will continue to bloom long after her presidency.

In the Auxiliary, as in nature, growth requires care, time, and courage—and Sharon brought all three to her leadership. Her travels were more than events; they were moments of connection, renewal, and transformation—reminding us that even the smallest acts of service can create a ripple effect of change. She has left behind more than memories—she leaves behind a trail of purpose, like butterfly wings brushing gently across the faces of those she served. And just as a butterfly never sees its own beauty but is admired by all who witness it, Sharon's grace in leadership has uplifted others and made the Department of Texas stronger, more vibrant, and full of life.

We thank her for the incredible year of dedication, for advocating boldly and serving humbly—and like the butterfly, for reminding us that through change, we all have the power to soar.

It all started with a phone call from the Dept President Sharon Phelps before arriving home from the Department convention. The message was clear – it's time to get to work on the ALA mission. The Division 2 President was ready to work but didn't know how interesting "work" was going to be. In a year's time there was one new unit started, one unit rechartered, a unit revived after a 2-year period of inactivity, one unit restored to good standing after a series of suspensions, one unit that voted to close, a potential merging of units, several potential unit closings, a resignation in leadership, one new District President elected, and many conflict management situations. The Division 2 District President displayed a commitment to this organization and the desire to handle each situation according to the proper

procedures. What a blessing to have so many ladies in this part of the state in leadership roles who were there to answer difficult questions and tackle whatever situation came before them.

The District, Division and the Department faced a couple of new scenarios. There were two National appeals from the state of Texas; both cases from within Division 2. One case was upheld by National and the other was not, presenting new challenges for the state of Texas. The Department met the challenges and has continued to work through them. It's through those challenges and triumphs this organization learns and becomes better.

The President's theme, "Advocating for Change, One Veteran at a Time," coupled with a butterfly blend beautifully together. The "Butterfly Effect" is the idea that small things can have a big impact. Division 2 was there making small changes affecting the lives of veterans one at a time.

Touring the Blind Rehabilitation Unit (BRU) was eye opening (pun intended). The training goes beyond the basics of everyday tasks to repairing leaky sinks, tandem bike riding, woodworking projects, painting, shooting arrows and firearms, etc. At a unit meeting, a mother and daughter, new ALA members, teared up because the daughter is seeing-impaired and knowing that a facility exists to assist others like her was encouraging. She knows first-hand the importance of those services. By sharing this story donations were made and more lives were impacted – the butterfly effect in action.

While touring the RISE unit there was a sense of pride seeing the contributions made by the units in my district. Those contributions were and are changing lives of the veterans needing the use of that facility. A picture was sent of a female veteran sleeping on the floor in the RISE unit. Her canine companion, complete with paperwork, was not permitted to sleep with her. The VA policy states no animals on the furniture. This has led to researching how to change the policy. Auxiliary members will continue to advocate for this policy change.

The butterfly effect could be seen in the Christmas Gift Shops. This was my first time helping the veterans shop. The men and women were so thankful for this event as over and over the words, "Thank you," kept pouring out. It was difficult not to be touched by a veteran writing a card to his family asking them to forgive him for his addiction and for all the hurt he caused his family. The same can be said of the veteran who found a teddy bear and clung to it, filling the need for security. Those seemingly small donations changed those veterans' lives.

As members record their volunteer hours and donations, the unit reports them collectively, then the district reports the numbers collectively, then the division, etc. Those seemingly small numbers from the members add up. Again, the butterfly effect is not only displayed but magnified. Division 2 recorded 174,535 volunteer hours and donations adding up to \$483,399.00. And those are only the recorded ones. So much more is done and never recorded.

There were also many events filled with hope for a brighter future. Listening to the students share about their research into different cancer treatments and students giving their speeches in the Oratorical contest were inspiring. It is comforting to know the future is in the good hands of these fine young men and women.

The year concluded with the spring conventions. I am thankful for those I have met and those who have shared their stories. I look forward to serving another year with them in the ALA journey.

District two had a good year for the 2024-2025 year. They had their Fall convention at Post 33 with both Department President and Division Two President in attendance. They also had a successful Spring Convention and training at Unit 49. Most Units were in attendance at both conventions.

The district was able to get Unit 493 rechartered and working hard to get everything up and running soon.

Unit 817 has completed all necessary training and is quickly getting their programs up and running. Unit 817 has held successful year with a Christmas Dance and Dinner, Black History Program and Mom's Brunch. They are always there to support Veteran's family's helping to host repast for their loved ones.

Unit 33, had an amazing year this year. They awarded seventeen scholarships totaling \$38,000. They make donations to ALA Department of Texas Education and Past President Parley, Cancer Research Fellowship program, ASYMCA, Spirit of Youth and Children of Warriors Scholarships to total over \$10,000. They are active

in the community by handing out "Stop Bullying" goodie bags, promoting patriotism by donating flags to local elementary schools and scout groups and Star-Spangle Kid kits. They help veterans and their families with assisting with living expenses, medical or dental needs as funds permit. Unit 33 is very active in supporting the Veterans who utilize the Beaumont VA with Christmas gift bags, cookie bags and Christmas boxes. All while also supporting the Beaumont VA Canteen in serving donuts and coffee to the Veterans. The Unit completed over 430 hours of VA&R service hours this year. Donated \$3,500 to Camp Hope/PTSD Foundation, \$2,000 to Birdwell foundation, and \$20,000 to help with the upkeep and beautification of their Post. Unit 33 will continue to sponsor the programs of the ALA Department of Texas and National by donating funds and working their programs.

Unit 49 put Piggie Banks out in the Post Club room to support Children and Youth. They collected \$151 and sent it to Department to support their cause. \$250 was raised for Orange County Sheriff's Department Blue Santa program for children and youth in the county. A donation of \$200 was given to Parks and Recreation Department to help purchase candy for annual Easter Egg Hunt. They participated in the city's annual Easter Egg Hunt. Unit 49 also sent a donation of \$300 to help with purchase of tiny homes in North Carolina after Hurricane Helene devastated that area. Unit 49 continues to support Department and National by upholding the values of the American Legion Auxiliary.

Unit 7 has been doing amazing work in the community and supporting the Veterans. They have held #3 spot in Department Membership. They support the Legionnaires of Post 7 with activities in the community and post. They provide rides to Veterans in their community to and from doctor's visits, grocery store runs and any other errands they need done. Members of the Unit also have crochet blankets and handed them out to Veterans in the community.

Unit 393 has been working with every member to get their unit functioning and participating more in the community. They participated in city activities to support the Veterans in Cleveland area. They are hoping to get a set location to meet, and be able to get more participation in meetings and events. The officers are doing regular buddy checks with the members and assisting them as they are able.

Let's take a walk through the 6th District Auxiliary Garden to witness all the wonderful things our American Legion Auxiliary unit butterflies have implemented this year. Looking at all the beautiful butterflies we can see that many projects were tended to, such as toy drives, Easter Egg Hunts, Halloween events, Christmas events, and even school supply collections to help meet the needs within their communities. Our lovely, fluttery Units also placed flags in cemeteries, participated in Wreaths Across America, raised awareness through Poppy distribution and participated with their cities in patriotic holidays and events.

As we pass through the peaceful spot of Cleburne Unit 50, we are reminded how peaceful a garden and its butterflies are, forgetting the many parts that keep it beautiful. Unit 50 cooked and delivered 90 Thanksgiving meals, stuffed 80 stockings and distributed them to 7 different nursing homes, participated in Needy Kids benefit to purchase gifts for veteran's families, and recognized first responders on 9/11. The first little flower we stop to rest at is in Waxahachie. Unit 137 has been hard at work growing as a new unit, by hosting several membership drives and increasing their unit numbers by 116%. They helped celebrate a post member's100th birthday by throwing a 'sweet' celebration. The social butterflies of this group also made Thanksgiving dinner and worked with the local VFW to make ensure our veterans were fed and feeling very loved during the holiday. It will be exciting to watch this unit continue to grow.

Many of the lovely 'flowers' in our garden continue from month to month. Unit 159 in Bryan has taken these lovely buds and fostered them into beautiful blooms. One such bloom is their Thursday morning coffee, kolache, and donut gathering. This bud has grown so much since last year, as they are now serving over 14 dozen donuts and 495 cups of coffee each week. They held a barbeque celebration in honor of the 10 girls they sponsored for Girls State. Unit 159 participated in Quilts of Valor, donated to the RISE unit, sponsored a Patriot Paws dog, collected school supplies and participated in many more of the Auxiliary's programs throughout the year.

As we continue our walk, we spot Groesbeck Unit 288 in full bloom. From sending Valentine's Day cards to the Temple VA Center to distributing poppies at the Memorial Day Service to volunteering at the local food banks and hosting the 2025 Spring District Convention, this beautiful group of butterflies certainly are busy.

Midlothian Unit 388 is a pleasant place to stop on our garden walk. They are busy little bees working at the Spring Market, a Pancake Fly-In at the Midlothian Airport, hosting a B-B-Q lunch after participating in the 4th of July parade, delivering Christmas gift bags to Senior Living Facilities and organizing a garage sale.

Alvarado is flittering with activity. If there is a patriotic ceremony you are guaranteed to find members of Unit 426 present and participating. The unit donated 18 cases of water to the Fire Stations in their area. They participated in the Old Settlers Reunion Parade, held the Four Chaplains Ceremony, a Purple Heart Ceremony and breakfast and many other programs honoring those who have served.

Along the path you can find a cute little flower who is not to be overlooked. Unit 491 is dedicated to helping all veterans in need, but when one of those in need is one of their own you will definitely see all their wings working overtime. They set up a large event that included dinners, silent auctions and 50/50 raffles to raise over \$6,000 to help with living and medical expenses for a long-time member.

The 6th District sent 31 girls to Girls State, provided 3 high school students with scholarships totaling \$2,000.00 and raised close to \$1852.00 when distributing poppies. DISTRICT 7 Beverly Sloan - Presídent

It was another wonderful year for District 7 President Beverly Sloan as she started the year off installing officers at Cold Springs Unit 629 and then headed to the Department Convention to hear all the wonderful things people have done throughout the year. She helped Post 411 start a new Auxiliary Unit and then worked with Rusk Post 293 and Nacogdoches Post 86 to help them start new units as well. Both of those units are completing the necessary paperwork. She then fluttered through the district to different units, listening to their plans for the year. In October, District 7 Units held their first District Picnic in Cold Springs. Unit 629 was a great host, making the arrangements for everyone to be at the marina, and then that night they had a live band, which was a great end to a wonderful day filled with fellowship, games, and sharing ideas. In the fall many of the District 7 Units held their annual activities, such as Halloween festivals, trunk-or-treat events, distribution of poppies, and Make a Difference Days to provide supplies for local schools. Unit 618 had a Halloween Carnival with a Haunted Trail that everyone agreed was truly haunted.

As the holidays came, the units moved into the holiday spirit and hosted Thanksgiving meals, fall festivals, parades, Veteran's Day celebrations, Christmas celebrations, placing wreaths on veterans' graves, and more. Lufkin Unit 113, Madisonville Unit 84, and Willis Unit 618 held their annual wreath-laying ceremony and placed wreaths at local cemeteries. The year ended with Christmas parties, Christmas parades, and the annual visit to the DeBakey VA Hospital Gift Shop, where Auxiliary members helped by donating things to the shop, helping veterans pick out gifts for their families, wrapping them for the veterans, and mailing them to their families. Auxiliary members also send Christmas cards to veterans and servicemembers around the world. Cold Springs, Unit 629 gave \$2000 worth of toys to Toys for Tots. Livingston, Unit 312, held their annual Community Christmas Party where every child received a bicycle or an electronic gift along with an opportunity to visit with Mr. and Mrs. Claus, who also gave them a gift along with a picture with them. There was food, games, and even a fire truck for kids to climb on. Beverly got to help with the games and being one of Santa's elves giving out the gifts to the children. They had over 600 children in attendance this year.

As the new year came in, the units in District 7 kept fluttering around hosting meals for veterans and helping veterans with needs such as housing, medical supplies, or just lending a listening ear. Throughout the year other activities took place, such as Unit 305 holding Americanism Essay contests at their local schools, Unit 134 in Crocket hosting a prom dress event for local girls to get a prom dress and accessories for prom night. Each month Unit 113 takes a van loaded with lap throws, telemetry bags, pillows, and ditty bags to the Houston VA. They also do quilts for the patients receiving cancer treatment. Unit 411 took on a project to help a local organization send 10,000 thank-you cards to the troops. During the spring as the butterflies began to flutter around East Texas units hosted Easter Egg hunts and other spring events to help support our children and veterans in the community. Unit 629 in Cold Springs provided 3 scholarships totaling \$2000 to seniors at their local school. This year District 7 sponsored over 20 girls for Girls State. Units in the 7th District also raised money through cook-offs, dinners, craft shows and bake sales. They sponsored CPR classes, blood drives, and flag disposal ceremonies. Unit 305 had over 100 participants at their flag disposal ceremony this year. If there is a need in their community, the 7th District units are glad to step up with a fundraiser to help meet that need.



DISTRICT 22 María Holmes - Presídent

Americanism: There were 4 units who participated in the Americanism program. The participation included handing out applications for the Americanism essays at area schools. Reciting the Pledge of Allegiance at meetings. Attending the Ceremonies at Christmas and Memorial Day for placing wreaths on the WW1 graves at Soldiers Rest in Forest Park Lawndale Cemetery.

Cancer Research: There were 5 units who participated in the Cancer Research Program by donating money to the Department. Unit 521 has an annual Cancer Dinner to raise money. The other 4 Units all attended and helped support the cause.

Children and Youth: There were 5 units who participated in Children and Youth activities. Events were put on for Children to receive gifts at Christmas. 4th of July events with games, food and prizes given to community children. Gift cards given to children of Active Military Serviceman. School supplies were collected and given to area community drives. Food was donated to Sarah's house for abused children.

Community Services: There were 6 units who participated in numerous Community Service projects. Money was donated to area churches, Gold Star Moms, Sarah's house. Food was donated to area food banks. Some of the units participated in their communities' parades. Blankets were distributed to area shelters. Some of the units participated in events for Seniors.

Poppies: 6 units participated in handing out poppies at different events or area restaurants in their communities, especially during Memorial and Veterans Day. Money was also donated to the Department for the Poppy Program.

Education and Scholarships. Some of the units had fundraisers to raise money for scholarships to be given out to seniors who were graduating. Over \$8000.00 in scholarships were given.

Girls State: 6 units had girls attend Girl's State. There was an orientation for all the unit's girls to attend.

VA&R: 7 Units participated in numerous activities to help Veterans. A few of the units attend quarterly visits to DeGeorge Hotel and play Bingo with the Veteran's that live there. Pillows, hygiene items, canned goods, cleaning supplies and snack packs were handed out. Items were also collected for Veteran's at Warriors Refuge in West Columbia. Dinners were held for Veteran's Day to honor them. Numerous units helped JoAnn Crawford (DeBakey VA Rep) with different projects she needed for the patients at The VA hospital. Some included making snack packs, meals, donating socks and underwear. Donating items for the Christmas store as well as volunteering at the hospital on the days the store was open. Visiting area nursing homes and bringing items to the Veteran's there.

Numerous units donated money to Department for other programs as well. This year there was a lot of support from each unit with events that units had. They attended Post 164 & Unit 164 grand opening at their new location, Unit 490's Christmas Dance, Unit 521's Cancer Research Dinner and Unit 472 hosting the Girl's State Orientation. 5 Of the units attended the District Conference.

As President this year I attended the Cancer Research Scholarship luncheon, Wreaths Across America event at Soldiers rest, Girls State Orientation, Unit 164's grand opening, Unit 490's Christmas Dance and their Veteran's Day baked potato dinner. Unit 521's Cancer Research Dinner. I was able to get together a group of ladies to get Unit 654 going again for 3 months but most dropped out due to miscommunications between the Post Commander, board members and the President of the Auxiliary. Serving the 9th District as President these past two years has been both rewarding and humbling. This year was kicked off with our Coffee Tour for the Galveston County Units. Each unit met with us and discussed plans for this year and any concerns they may be facing. The Fall Convention was held in Sugar Land, hosted by Unit 942, it included a brief information training by Mary Waddell, Past Department President, discussing the program basics and bringing awareness to the medical scholarships. We discussed and updated the bylaws concerning our 9th District Junior Program and submitted the changes to Department. There were 7 units represented at this convention with many new members attending. Spring Convention was held in Missouri City and kicked off with training by Past Department President Teresa Simmon-Copeland on Saturday. Units are actively working within their communities by making donations and partnering with local police and fire departments, assisting in schools, and supporting their post functions. Units supported Children & Youth by hosting Children's Easter, Halloween, and Christmas Parties for their communities and provided Food baskets at Thanksgiving and Christmas for needy families. They are raising funds by hosting bake sales, soup sales, vendor events, and dipping chocolate strawberries. Americanism is shown by posting flags at meetings, saying the pledge, hosting veterans' day and Memorial Day programs, participating in patriotic parades, and sending students to Girls State. Unit 554 organized and hosted a "Spirit of '45" celebration (in collaboration with the Legionnaires, Sons, & Riders) with special quest speaker Buck Sloan, a WWII Veteran, who served on the European Honor Guard that fired the 21-gun salute to honor President F.D. Roosevelt. The units of the 9th District continuously showed their heart for our programs and communities and reported 11,142 hours volunteered, 837 Veterans assisted, 855 Military Families assisted, and 20 scholarships given to graduating seniors totaling \$17,200. More than 1200 Poppies were distributed at local businesses resulting in donations more than \$3,485.00.

While it goes without saying that some are struggling with the familiar issues of membership shrinkage and participation decline as they face the inevitable reality of time and the human condition taking its toll. It is also true that others are finding new paths to successful growth and supporting their units with vitality and strength even in the most challenging situations. While visiting with members, regardless of the situation, it is easy to see the smiles of welcoming faces and to witness their strength in the stories from the past and their plans for the future.



DISTRICT 14 Pattí Shows - Presídent

Focus was on officers and membership. Another great convention.

Patti's focus in her second year will be training, using social media, mentoring, and volunteering.



DISTRICT 19 Irene Szwarc – Presídent

This has been a roller coaster year for District 19. Word was received shortly after the last Department Convention that Port Lavaca Post 167 wanted to start up an Auxiliary. The late summer and fall were spent getting the Unit put together and walking them through the basics. In December the Charter was given to the new formed Unit so there was a big celebration at their Christmas party. There were still a few hurtles to jump with incorporation and the bank but that was finally accomplished.

The district was riding a high with that news only to crash to the ground with the notice from East Bernard that after years of struggle and no forward motion they had decided to close. At the end of January their closing papers were accepted and forwarded to Department. So, in the space of a few months, the district had gone from 11 Units to 12 and then back to 11.

During the year all the District Auxiliary Units were active in programs benefiting veterans in the VA & R programs, participating in Memorial Day and Veterans Day programs as well as special Veterans Appreciation Days. This information was confirmed not just in narratives submitted but in visits and phone calls to the Units. Also, all 11 Units sent in their Christmas Assessment, Unit Data Form, Certification of Officers, and bond fee. Only four of the 11 sent verification of turning in their 990s.From the Units reporting, only 9 young ladies went to Girls State. This is a significant decrease from previous years.

Three Units from the 19th District (Schulenburg, La Grange, and Flatonia) and one from the 9th District (Shelby) banded together with their Posts and the VFW from La Grange, Vietnam Veterans Chapter 870, the Marine Corps League Colorado Detachment and Praha Veterans to put on the first Annual Armed Forces Appreciation Dinner and Dance in Flatonia on May 18, 2024. It was a huge success.

All Units gave back to the veterans all year round by delivering meals to homebound veterans and auxiliary members, collecting items and donations for the ASYMCA and military families, monetary and clothing donations to the Houston Michael E. DeBakey VAMC, Thanksgiving food basket drives for the Family Crisis Center, as well as donations to the Deputy Santa Program. One Unit with some Post members, planned visits to the three assisted living centers in their area to sit with veterans, visit, and encourage them to tell their stories. Most Units distributed poppies for Memorial Day and Veterans Day at schools, from businesses in the towns, to the Poppy Lady walking the courthouse, square, and surrounding businesses.

Of the Units reporting, 12 scholarships were presented for students in the area, totaling \$4,750.

The 19th District held their 4th annual District Convention on March 15, 2025, in Hallettsville at the American Legion Hall Post 230. A memorial was held for the veterans followed by the Legionnaires holding their business session and the Auxiliary holding a mini training led by Holly Heatly, Leadership chairman. Following a meal and raffle prizes, the Auxiliary held their annual business session. Guest speaker was Department President Sharon Phelps. Elections were held and Irene Szwarc was re-elected as President and Nicole Ebner was elected as Vice President for the 2025 – 2027 year. Door prizes were given out following the meeting.

As this report was being written, the East Bernard Post contacted this District President about not shutting down the Auxiliary. The district is in the process of seeing why this has suddenly surfaced and if there is a true possibility for breathing life back into the East Bernard Unit.

All Units report issues in being able to attract younger local members and are afraid of the future as most current members are in their 80's or 90's.

One Unit, Ganado 346, has been working hard this year to reestablish their taxexempt status. Unknown to the membership, their past President, who suddenly resigned and moved last year, had not filed the Unit 990s for the last three years causing the Unit to lose their tax-exempt status.

Even with information coming directly from Department to the Unit Presidents communication still appears to be in limbo. Sometimes to get a response, this District President has had to individually email/call/text the Unit President. Upon questioning, they will a.) deny getting any email, or b.) when the email is described they remember it but claim they did not think it applied to them. This President notes that some Units, even after several years of being told not to do this, still

refer to themselves in the newspaper, on the officer certifications, and the Unit Data forms as "the Ladies Auxiliary". Frequently they even do not remember what Division they are in. New Presidents, who should have a problem with this are not the major offenders, but it is the "seasoned" Presidents who are the culprits.

Again, welcome into the fold, Port Lavaca (Calhoun County) Unit 167.

19th District Statistics

As of this report, there are 11 Units in the 19th District. In December of 2024, Unit 167 Calhoun County (Port Lavaca) was welcomed into the district. In January of 2025 East Bernard Unit 226 turned in their paperwork to close out their Unit. Existing Units are Unit 94 Flatonia; Unit 102 La Grange; Unit 143 Schulenburg;

Unit 167 Port Lavaca; Unit 230 Hallettsville; Unit 251, El Campo Unit 338, Round Top; Unit 392 Moulton; Unit 571 Moulton; and Unit 571 Blessing.

July 4th is always a way to show off our veterans and support for great country. Our units did everything from veterans as grand Marshalls, kids booths with Americanism items of coloring books, and flags. To sending care packages to troops overseas.

DISTRICT 16 Jane Bennett - Presídent

In her first year as 16th District president, Janie attended the National Convention in New Orleans, all Department of Texas conventions, the 4th Division convention and conducted two fun and informative District conventions with trainings in Leadership by PDP Myra Cooper, Membership, Poppy, Americanism, and PR. Attendees were assisted with setting up Unit websites and designing eye-catching flyers; given "Star Spangled Kids Kits" with assembly ideas such as America the

Beautiful coloring books, Pledge of Allegiance book marks, American Flag comic books, and more; what to distribute with poppies to generate more donations such as "LolliPoppies", Poppy coloring books and Poppy Bears; how to submit membership electronically and utilize ALA MIS effectively; and how to update and use Unit governing documents to lead their Units to success.

16th District Units observed all patriotic holidays, Teacher Appreciation and Education Weeks, Christmas, Valentine's Day and other holidays with gifts, cards, supplies, and lots of community interaction. They distributed Poppies, placed thousands of flags and wreaths on military graves on Memorial Day, Veterans Day and Christmas, and delivered a gazillion school supplies. Many Unit members attended all conventions, several Leadership training sessions, and volunteered for Department of Texas Program Committees. Several members went on a tour of the Ft Bliss Armed Services YMCA to see how their Units could help with food, baby supplies, clothing and school donations for at least 300 families on the Base who are struggling to make ends meet.

Unit 19 Midland distributed more than 400 Poppies, raising over \$3,000. They handed out 450 "Star Spangled Kids Kits" at the Midland Airshow, the Midland Children's Rehabilitation Center "rodeo" and events at their Post, including 4 Family Days. They collected 65 moving boxes full of school supplies from Operation Homefront and delivered them to 10 schools, 15 teachers, the Midland Soup Kitchen and Family Promise, and awarded 11 college scholarships. They made several trips to Big Spring to the VA Hospital with 46 patients, and the Texas Veteran Retirement Home Laymun-Lusk-Sanchez with around 150 residents, to deliver snacks and soft drinks. At Christmas, they donated piles of Christmas gifts, clothing and treats to both facilities. For Valentine's for Veterans, they delivered 350 cookies, boxes of chocolates, and bags of gummie bears with 300 cards from local school kids given to the veterans by Little Miss Poppy Aspynn Beeson with a hug. They even danced with veterans and sang karaoke at the Retirement Home party. Unit 19's complete remodel and conversion of 2 Post bathrooms to ADA compliance was featured in a National ALA Magazine article.

Unit 36 El Paso held a huge Vietnam Veteran Dance and fundraiser attended by 400 people and organized hundreds of coffee mugs stuffed with treats for the VA Clinic in El Paso. They also delivered 80 backpacks to an elementary school.

Unit 58 El Paso raised \$1,500 with a "Designer Purse Bingo" event to benefit the Rio Grande Cancer Foundation. On Patriot Day, they provided meals for firefighters and police departments. The Post 58 Family hosted a wonderful 16th District Spring Convention, where we were presented with a certificate designating our District as a "Purple Heart District".

Unit 79 Alpine delivered 50 zippered "Period Pouches" to nurses at elementary, middle and high schools. They also donated 25 copies of the Berenstein Bears book "God Bess American" to the Valentine ISD.

Unit 122 Anthony participated in a Veterans Day "Children's Reading Day" at Don Haskins elementary school, reading to 250 children and inviting veterans to share their stories. They partnered with their SAL squadron to donate 100 blankets to homeless veterans and delivered 100 winter jackets to children in need. They cohosted a New Years Eve dance with other El Paso Posts and helped recruit kids for their American Legion Baseball Team.

Unit 430 Odessa donated \$500 to the Permian Basin Honor Flight. They adopted a nursing home and visited the veterans with gifts on Valentine's Day, Easter and Christmas. They were featured in an article for the ALA National Magazine honoring their flag program called "The Last Patriotic Act", where they collect retired flags to be draped over veteran caskets for cremation with the veteran.

Unit 598 Horizon City held a flag retirement ceremony with their mayor and fed their local fire and police departments. They also hosted local Girl Scout and Boy Scout Troops at their Post on a weekly basis. Horizon City also hosted a fabulous 16th District Fall Convention.

Unit 832 El Paso partnered with other El Paso Units to serve snacks at the El Paso VA Clinic for 3 months each out of every year. Unit member and CDCE Rep Velois Vaughan volunteered 3 days a week at the VA Clinic. Unit 832 is working on a partnership with the Fort Bliss Armed Services YMCA to help military families in the El Paso area.

All Units are up to date on their mandatory donations and paperwork, and the 16th District has 4 Units at or over 100% membership, with several Units close behind. With 8 out of 11 Units reporting, the 16th District assisted over 3,800 veterans, military and their families, volunteered over 17,000 hours and donated almost \$52,000. Community Service hours totaled over 2,600, with donations of over \$51,000. More than 3,200 hours were volunteered for Children and Youth, and Girls State, with over \$22,000 donated and 17 college scholarships awarded.

It has been a great honor to serve as the 17th District President of the Department of Texas American Legion Auxiliary. There have been times of sadness, times of uncertainty and times of great reward. It is always a challenge that a President should take to increase their knowledge of this great organization. The units in the 17th District are all easy to work with and they take our mission seriously.

President Nancy uses the internet to stay in contact with her units. President Nancy keeps all units abreast and informed of all information from our department office. There have been many visits to the units in this past year. President Nancy has attended many functions of several units during this past year. A Great Big Shout Out to Units 61 Abilene, 75 Mineral Wells, 163 Weatherford, 240 Stephenville, 57 Abilene, 82 Baird and unit 661 Lueders. There have been great things going on in these units all year. Unit 82 Baird recruited 8 new members and reached all the membership goals by January 1 2025.

The President's job is made easier when all the officers are working together, which is exactly what happens in the 17th District. Membership is a top priority in the 17th District. Each unit competes with each other from September 1 till March 15th to see who gets a certificate for most membership percentage and most new members each year. We call it Retain – Renew and Recruit for the 17th. In the paragraph above you see that Unit 82 reached 114% and recruited 8 new members for the year.

All the units in the 17th District have worked hard this year with their Posts and Sons on fund raisers and volunteer their time and services to their communities. There has been a total of over 21,000 hours volunteered in this district just this past year. Americanism was and is promoted at any time the Units take part in parades, meetings, flag ceremonies; POW/MIA Remembrances and flag folding ceremonies.

Cancer Research is a program that each Unit takes an active part in. They contribute to the Cancer Research Program through yearly or monthly donations. President Nancy encourages each unit to do fund raisers during the year to help this program because Cancer has touched most all of us in one way or another.

Children and Youth is a program near and dear to her heart. Children are our next generation and if we don't start now, well let's just say we won't be here in a few more years. Unit 61 in Abilene is very active in their community with children. They provided many events and services in their community and covered 22 families and volunteered 76.5 hours with donations of over \$1300.00. Unit 75 Mineral Wells holds a Veteran's Day program where it is held at their football field and for over an hour you will witness bus after bus bringing the children – youth and teenagers to the ballfield to wave their American Flags and watch the program from the bleachers. These are just a few of the ways that District 17 is trying to incorporate Children and Youth and Education together.

Unit 240 in Stephenville bakes cookies each month and deliveries them to the EMS – Police – Sheriff's Department and the Fire Departments. This is a way of reaching their community and thanking them for their service as many of those same men and women are Veterans.

Unit 163 works with several different organizations in Weatherford where they as a Unit hand out poppies and get donations for Wreaths across America. The Wreaths across America program is both a community service, education, children and youth as well as Americanism and VA&R program. The Unit places wreaths on every Veterans grave at Memory Gardens Cemetery in December where approximately 750 Veterans have found their final resting place. The Weatherford community comes out and helps with the wreath placing. President Nancy is the chair for the Wreath program and it makes the heart happy to see families there placing wreaths on that day and teaching the little ones the value of our Freedom. It teaches the younger generation the respect that a Veteran should receive especially at Christmas where they are not forgotten.

Some members of units attend unaccompanied veterans' funerals. Some members simply sit with a veteran at a nursing home. Some attend the Gold Star Mothers ceremonies at state cemeteries.

District 17 juniors are just as busy. They are earning patches for volunteer work alongside the senior members of their unit. Unit 661 in Lueders has one such junior that has over 20 patches for her volunteer work with the senior members. District 17 has 3 juniors that are officers in the Department of Texas Junior program.

VA&R program is worked by all units and some of our Units have a Veteran in their unit.

Our space is limited and I could fill up a few more pages with the accomplishments of each unit in the 17th District. Our Unit members volunteer daily and weekly to make a difference one Veteran at a time.

President Nancy continues to spread the word about the ALA and their services with her church members, along the highways and byways of her travels to many different states. We have visited 6 American Legions in 6 different states, and there is no place like TEXAS. Her officers this term were Parliamentarian and Guest Chair both Past Presidents of Department, Sgt at Arms and Assistant Sgt at Arms are both Veterans and are mother and daughter. Her Vice President Letitia has kept her junior on track getting more patches for her volunteer work. Her secretary is very organized and makes sure that our minutes are recorded properly and timely. The 2025 District Spring Convention was held on Saturday March 8th, 2025, at Kerrville Post 208.

District 21 consists of the following 16 Units: Bandera 157, Bangs 308, Boerne 313, CenterPoint 583, Harper 650, Kerrville 208, Kingsland 437, Lakehills 410, Lampasas 277, Leakey 489, Lometa 116, Mason 285, Northlake-Brownwood 470, Priddy 487, San Angelo 572 and Uvalde 479 which is a combined land area of almost 234 square miles.

It is often a challenge to stay active in these small rural areas but these units do not let that slow them down! They are out there every day working the programs for our Veterans and communities.

Bandera 157 has had a very busy year. Unit President, Gerda Weathers and members have been busy visiting two nursing homes in Bandera. They keep the residents entertained by playing games such as Bunko which are fun for everyone. The Bandera unit loves to bake! They do a monthly cookie party for nursing home residents and just this past year alone, have made four hundred dozen.... that's right....*FOUR HUNDRED DOZEN* cookies. That is a total of almost 5,000 cookies!! They also provide HOMEMADE desserts for first responders, teachers and the nursing staff at the nursing homes they visit.

In addition to all of that baking, they provide annual donations to local organizations in their area such as Silver Sage, Meals on Wheels, Bandera Livestock Show, K-9's, Boys and Girls Club of the Texas Frontier (Bandera County). Even with all those activities, all that baking and volunteering, they found time to recruit seven (7) new members!! Way to go Bandera!

Kerrville 208 has also had a very busy year. Every Easter they do an Easter Egg hunt on the lawn of the Kerrville VA Hospital. The Veterans and their families love it! They also send care packages overseas to troops (usually twice a year). They have an annual school supply drive as well. They provide first responders with cookies on 9/11.

Their fundraiser for cancer awareness was so successful last year that they decided to do it again this year. They literally turn the Post pink for their "Paint the Post Pink for Cancer" fundraiser. Cancer survivors' handprints in every color representing different types of Cancer can be found throughout the Post. They have a potluck, raffles and drawings. All proceeds are donated to the ALA Cancer Awareness program.

Halloween is always fun at the Kerrville Post when they do Fright Night at the Park. This year there were over 3,000 kiddos who came out to join in the fun! They baked goodies for the VA car show and for the 2nd year in a row, took 1st place for the most money raised for the inpatient needs.

And if that isn't enough, they also do an Angel tree for Christmas for those families that would otherwise not have a Christmas. They also provide food boxes to Veterans in need so they can enjoy a delicious Christmas meal. Well, done Kerrville 208!

Bangs 308. Where does one begin? There is so much to say about Bangs 308! Just last year we though they were going to be turning in their Charter when all of a sudden, Unit President, Alyce Suddeth, showed up at the District Convention raring to go!

This year Bangs has increased their membership to 12 members! They managed to contribute 50 volunteer hours with only 8 members. They placed flags at their local cemetery. They are building a memorial wall at their local nursing home for Veterans that will consist of the Veteran's picture, their Military affiliation and a brief story. Together with the Legionnaires, they build beds for children who have no bed! The sky's the limit for this unit! Way to go Bangs 308!

Kingsland 437. With only a handful of active members, you can often hear Unit President, Hilda Lindt saying "we are small but mighty". The members of Unit 437 stay busy throughout the year. They have recently started to do a meal night on the first and fourth Thursday of the month. They have taco night, spaghetti night. pizza night, etc. Money raised from meal nights is used to help fund quarterly donations to Meals on Wheels and Sharing the Harvest, their local food pantry.

The Kingsland Auxiliary participates in the 4th of July "AquaBoom" parade where they pass out American Flags and candy to children. They also participate in the Christmas Festival of lights parade.

They have also started to hold dances where they hire a DJ, provide food and snacks and decorate the hall. These dances are open to the public. Children are welcome. They use these functions as a fun way to get the community involved and also to recruit new members. They have now held three dances and each time they are becoming more successful.

This past year they have donated candy to the Kerrville VA for their Halloween party. They provided the items needed to make 300 dump cakes for the Kerrville VA. They passed out poppies, assisted the Legion with Flag retirement ceremonies and hosted many Quilts of Valor events. Lastly, Unit 437 members reported volunteering 180 hours and spending \$1,119 dollars for the 2024-2025 Year.

In keeping with the Purpose of the American Legion Auxiliary's Emergency Fund, raising funds for and promoting knowledge about the program, the A.E.F. Committee is proud to announce that as of April 28, 2025, \$16,134.01 was raised in support of this essential program.

Donations came from the arduous work of twenty-five units, one District, individual donors, as well as fundraising by the Texas AEF Committee itself. As is typical of our organization's members, they always find a way to make the "magic" happen.

In reading the narratives received, and from what the A.E.F. Committee saw on a variety of Texas ALA Facebook pages, a great deal of our units fundraised throughout the year with rummage sales, bake sales, burger burns, a variety of themed dinners, hosted chili cookoffs, collected cans, worked local festivals, raffled baskets, made donations in the names of members that passed, and of course the tried-and-true collection jug set by the monthly meeting sign-in sheet. Texas is also fortunate to have units that host Bingo, and which are truly kind with their donations, each donating over \$1,500 each.

The Texas AEF Committee itself did a bit of fundraising. To coincide with President Sharon's butterfly theme, the committee dressed as entomologists, hats on and nets in hand, and sold butterfly cutouts during the D.E.C. program fair, as well as selling 50/50 tickets to be drawn at the Department Convention. The Committee also created an incentive called "Texas' 100 for \$100", in which an individual or Unit donating at least \$100 would receive a "Collector" Vintage AEF pin. The donor was also placed into a drawing for a \$100 prize.

The Texas AEF Committee made sure to get the word out about the AEF program, its requirements and benefits, at every opportunity given; unit meetings, District and Division conventions as well as D.E.C., Midwinter and Annual Department Conventions. The Committee also submitted articles to the Department's bimonthly bulletin.

Though the Committee was disappointed in the sparse number of end-of-year reports received, we know the members understood the program's importance as was witnessed by the more than generous donations made throughout the year. CANCER RESEARCH Ann Puglíano - Chaírman

The American Legion Auxiliary Department of Texas Cancer Research Program is a Texas-based one of a kind program that provides scholarships for graduate students studying cancer research at the University of Texas Graduate School of Biomedical Science at M.D. Anderson Cancer Center Hospital in Houston. More than 1.7 million has been awarded to nearly 200 high achieving doctoral students trained by MD Anderson and UTHealth Houston's leading biomedical scientists. The American Legion Auxiliary Units across the great state of Texas have worked diligently to turn in as much money as possible to forward to MD Anderson. Here are just a few of the things that these dedicated units have accomplished.

Bedford Unit 379 – Each year dedicates an entire weekend filled with good food and live entertainment. Many baskets, gift cards, and poppers continue to be popular. Cancer jewelry was also available to help with awareness. They have a goal of \$20,000 for their 20 years of fundraising for a cause that has touched everyone's lives.

Pasadena Unit 521 – Each year this unit holds a Cancer Research Dinner and Program where they sell Luminaries to honor loved ones that have survived this horrible disease and to memorialize those who have passed away.

Midland Unit 19 – They not only donated to our Cancer Research, but they collected to help one of their members, participated in the Breast Cancer Chili Cookoff, ran the Bloody Mary Booth and participated in many other events to help raise Cancer Awareness.

Willis Unit 618- Each year they donate \$100 per month to help combat this disease.

Madisonville Unit 84 – donated \$1.00 for each member.

Farris Anderson Unit 75 has a jar marked \$1.00 from each member for the Cancer Fund that they collect at each meeting.

Lubbock Unit 575 – They did unit and individual donations and contributed to the Bike to Fight Cancer project.

Conroe Unit 411 – Even though they are a new unit they included the entire Legionnaire Family in their efforts to collect funds. At each meeting a piggy bank named Ms. Unipig was placed on the table for members to put their loose change. This was for "Change for Cancer."

Division 2 contributed to Cancer Research; along with District 11 and District 20.

The Department of Texas American Legion Auxiliary has been active this past year, working throughout the state to support and assist children, particularly those from veterans and military families. The auxiliary has engaged in various initiatives, such as providing school supplies through programs like Benbrook Unit 297 "Stuff the Bus" and organizing school supply drives to distribute backpacks filled with necessary items. Midland Unit 19 donated 60 boxes of school supplies to 8 elementary and 2 high schools in their community and contributed \$1000 to the A S YMCA in Killeen. Abilene Unit 61 expresses their gratitude to the school bus drivers by hosting a breakfast at the start of each school year. These individuals, with their exceptional composure, ensure that our children safely travel to and from school each day. Additionally, several units have made monetary donations to schools for various needs.

In autumn, orange and black butterflies organize fall festivals or Halloween carnivals. During these events, Halloween coloring books with crayons are provided, and various crafts and games are organized for the participants. In

addition to our poppy lollipops, assorted candy, flags, and toy soldiers are distributed to the children in attendance.

Unit 511 Wynnewood Butterflies participated in Red Ribbon Week. Unit 159 in Bryan read books such as "America's White Table" and "Twenty-One Steps," while Greenville Unit 17 read "The Poppy Lady" to school children. Additionally, Odessa Unit 430 donated copies of Bernstein Bears' "God Bless America" to local schools. Other units, like Lueders Unit 661, provided school equipment such as wooden kitchenettes and utensils for Pre-K students.

The red, white and blue butterflies like Mineral Wells Unit 75 help with Patriotic events, including flag placement and wreaths on veterans' graves organized by Wreaths Across America, are held to honor and remember our veterans. Additionally, our Katy Unit 164 butterflies help our children to organize "Breakfasts with Veterans" to show appreciation and support for their service.

During Christmas, the multi-colored tinsel butterflies held festive parties where Santa Claus, and occasionally Mrs. Claus, distribute gifts to the children and provide special treats such as cookies, cupcakes and candy canes. Santa has even shown up in a surprise aircraft landing at a Naval air Station to hand out gifts to the military children. Let's not forget our "Purple Up "Day

Our organization offers a variety of engaging and meaningful activities, including picnic days, arts and crafts sessions, and playdays. Unit 593 Converse also organize events such as egg coloring activities, Easter egg hunts with the Easter Bunny, and Huntsville Unit 95 helped with classroom projects like planting Victory Gardens for growing vegetables. Additionally, our members engage in community service by gathering clothing and personal hygiene items for military children, organizing chili cook-offs to benefit special needs children, and sponsoring rehabilitation centers with horse therapy programs for children with cerebral palsy. I wish I could post all the photos of our members, joining together wearing their purple shirts, to show their love and support on this special day.

It is important to highlight our participation in the Girl State program, which continues to expand annually. Each Unit that has turned in a report to this committee acknowledges that they sent one or multiple candidates to this exceptional program in Sequin.

Lastly, we would like to highlight the significant number of scholarships awarded to the younger generation, who represent our future. These scholarships will support various fields, including medicine, education, engineering, veterinary science, and pastoral studies. Regardless of the chosen field, these individuals represent both our future and the future of our children. The Children and Youth Committee is honored to present this report in the book of reports. Texas continues to inspire and positively impact on the lives of our children through the submission of reports, over 5,800 hours of volunteering, and the awarding of nearly \$24,000 in scholarships



COMMUNITY SERVICE Joan Críder - Chaírman

The American Legion Auxiliary Units in The Department of Texas was very busy this year working all of our programs. Many of the activities overlapped programs.

At the first of the year the Community Service committee helped guide our units by giving them ideas and suggestions of ways to promote and do community service in our communities. We encouraged them to think outside of the box. Ideas like starting a community garden, teach tech skills at retirement homes or start a recycling program.

I am going to highlight some of the amazing events and activities the Units of Texas did throughout the year.

Wallis Unit 200 is a very proud sponsor of the Austin County Champion Drive. Their purpose is to provide special needs youth the opportunity to participate in a livestock show experience at the county fair. Each child is paired with a "buddy" exhibitor (4H or FFA student). This allows them to do something that they never thought possible to participate in.

Conroe Unit 411 Held a Valentine's Day Party for residents of a local nursing home. They selected a king and queen for the day. Everyone got a gift along with cupcakes and punch.

Unit 297 Benbrook donated supplies for a "butterfly garden" at an elementary school. A Pre-K teacher and loves to share her love of nature with her students. It is such a joy to see their little faces light up learning about butterflies.

Unit 297 also has a sewing group that makes items for their community. Items like heart pillows for chemo patients, carry-all bags for the homeless stuffed with goodies and snacks, Fleece scarfs and blankets for local patient center. Also, members work making "tied" fleece blankets that are delivered to local chemo and dialysis centers. During the year 2024-2025 Unit 297 donated over 400 blankets.

Harlingen Unit 205 spends a day collecting funds for Camp Corral, a non-profit 50l(c) (3). This is a program thru Golden Corral restaurant and is a free one of a kind summer camp for children of wounded, injured or fallen military.

At the beginning of the school year Abilene Unit 61 recognizes the School Bus Drivers by providing breakfast at their first day of training. Our bus drivers carry the future to and from school and events. They are sometimes the only normal and comfort from a crazy world at home and at school. They handle traffic, unruly kids, teacher's demands, parents and so many rules and regulations. They are unsung heroes.

Midland Unit 19 does a huge community program, but I found this particular activity as a standout. They distribute "Blessing Bags" filled with hygiene and comfort items for homeless women at the Midland Soup Kitchen. Also "Blessing Bags" with socks, winter caps and gloves to the Salvation Army Homeless program.

Another fun activity that Unit 19 did this year was to give a "SURVIVAL KIT" for First Responders. The kit consisted of various candies.

LIFESAVER-- to remind you of the many times you've been one. STARBURST-- for the burst of energy you need.

PAYDAY-- since you're not doing it for the money. HERSHEY'S KISSES-- to show our love for you GUM-- to help everyone stick together

TOOTSIE ROLL-- you have to roll with the punches PEPPERMINT PATTY helping you keep your cool SNICKERS-- to help keep your humor **MOUNDS--** for the mounds of courage you show.

There is so much more that the Texas Units do for community service. Food banks, volunteering at numerous activities within their towns. I only scratched the surface with this report.

The Texas Girls State session will take place at Texas Lutheran University in Seguin, Texas, from Sunday, June 15, 2025 to Saturday, June 21, 2025.

The 2024 Samsung American Legion Scholarship National Finalist from Texas is Nicole Namy. At the national level, Nicole was named one of the 20 Regional Finalists and received a \$5000.00 scholarship.

Each year before the session begins, Texas Girls State counselors and staff participate in a well-planned 3-day orientation program. During this time our counselors and staff bond and learn the expectations of their positions.

During the 2024 week at Girls State, citizens participated in formulating city, county, and state government. They elected officials at all three levels and functioned in their respective positions. The citizens were also exposed to political parties. Party officials were elected as well. Every citizen was assigned to the House of Representatives or the Senate. They had the opportunity to write bills, debate them, and increase their knowledge of appropriate procedures. In preparation for their legislative sessions, the citizens were able to access current Texas law through databases on electronic tablets that were provided for their use. Electronic voting/filing for office was implemented during the 2015 session of Texas Girls State. In 2022 Texas Girls State presented a Career Fair. Both were so successful and well-received that they became part of the standard procedures at Girls State. Unfortunately, the 2024 Citizens of Girls State did not get to visit the Capitol because the House and Senate chambers were closed. Also, during the week at Girls State, the citizens gathered to hear guest speakers on various subjects, learned about ALA programs/membership, and participated in this premier program known as ALA Texas Bluebonnet Girls State.

The Girls State Committee is grateful to the dedicated efforts of the local units and schools who continue to actively support the Girls State Program. The success of the program begins at the unit level.



JUNIOR ACTÍVITIES Nícole Ebner - Chaírman

Juniors from across the state have been "Advocating for Change, One Veteran at a Time" this year. At our Department Convention the Juniors collected health and beauty goods to be sent to the YMCA in Killeen and the VA hospitals. The girls went to Top Golf for the fun activity and enjoyed their annual Pool & Pizza Party. Due to scheduling conflicts the juniors did not hold a meeting at the Mid-Winter Conference this year.

Junior members stay busy within their districts, units and communities. It is amazing to watch these girls honor our veterans and watch them grow through this organization. Abilene Unit 61 had junior members help shop for items for the Standdown, help with APD Trunk or Treat, made ornaments for Adopted Veterans to go with the Units gifts they gave them, and they had juniors help assist in obtaining pet supplies. Willis Unit 618 had juniors raise money with a 50/50 raffle at the President's Parley Cook-off. For the Halloween Carnival they helped set up,

dressed in costumes, and helped run some of the games. At the We Care Cookoff they worked the silent auction and helped make plates at the Thanksgiving Dinner. In December they helped decorate the hall for Christmas, placed wreaths for Wreaths Across Willis and passed out gifts at the Christmas Party. At Easter they helped stuff Easter eggs and worked several other cook-offs throughout the year.

Missing Man Unit 667 reports that while they have 18 junior members, many live out of town or are young and are not active locally. Their juniors are lucky to have their dues paid after their first year of membership until they turn 18. The Woodlands Unit 305 has 13 junior members and have one very active member who attends their meetings and events. She passes out poppies, helps with the craft booth and places wreaths on Veterans' graves. She also earned three patches this year and was able to put them on a sash that an auxiliary member sewed for her. Moulton Unit 392 junior members helped out at local events at the post, collected items for Department Service Projects, attended Department meetings, and helped at the Memorial Day Service. They also collected toys and canned goods for the Deputy Santa Program.

Dallas Unit 511 is working on growing membership by holding a membership drive at every event. Juniors wore R.E.D. on Fridays and helped with the Back-to-School Drive filling over 250 backpacks for military children. They raised over \$500 participating in the Cancer Awareness Walk to send to the Department of Texas. Juniors sold food to raise money for toys for children at Christmas during the Dallas Cowboys games, and participated in the Health Fair where they learned to perform CPR. They partnered with Soldier Angels to collect over 25 pounds of candy for the Treats for Troops event. They worked the arts and crafts table and hid eggs during the Easter Egg Hunt and participated in the Veteran's Day essay contest.

Carrollton Unit 597 has young members, but they are very active. They attend the Senior Auxiliary meetings and lead the Pledge of Allegiance, assist the Sergeantat-Arms in the draping the POW/MIA chair. They have been busy earning patches this year and assisted the senior members during fundraising activities. They hosted a Lemonade Stand and a Hot Cocoa Stand. They led the Military Child Table Setting Ceremony, handed out Poppy stickers at the Medal of Honor Museum event, and helped in placing over 500 flags at the Carrollton Veterans Memorial for Veterans Day and Memorial Day. They helped with Wreaths Across America, helped serve over 1,000 Thanksgiving meals at a local Soup Kitchen, and participated in the Blue Santa Program. We have units throughout the state who do not have active junior members, but they willingly support our junior projects on the Department level. We have over 1500 Junior members spread throughout the State of Texas and elsewhere. I know there are many more things these members are helping our Veterans and their units with that just does not get reported. Many do not realize they are even helping out or their units do not know what they have done.

We are gearing up for our Department Convention and preparing to watch these girls continue to grow in our great organization. It is amazing to watch the junior members grow up in our organization with many of them now having daughters who have followed in their footsteps and become members.

Texas started off the 2024-2025 administrative year and we hit the ground running. It all began at the 2023-2024 Department post-convention meeting with a mini workshop for our incoming Committee Chairs as well as incoming District and Division Presidents.

We then followed it up reaching out to our district and division presidents to establish contact. The department uses various methods to reach out to our members in masse such as bulletins, web sites, social media and conventions and conferences. In each of these opportunities we highlighted the many tools available to our members on our Department Website as well as our national website. She has said many times over the years that it was a huge learning experience and definitely helped her in the years to come as she would pursue the high office of Department President. Taking all her past experiences with her, this was still a challenging job but she was determined to see it through and help the

ALA continue its legacy for many more years to come with the help of her committee members Gillian Woodstrom, Shelli Creech, and Shawna Dunlap. The fun started at the Fall DEC with a "round robin" set up where each committee had a table of information, games, and fun. By visiting each table, members received door prize chances. The Membership Committee held a "Do You Know" board with questions about the ALA. They were told that some of the questions were hard, but everyone learned a little something new. The Membership Committee raffled off a large basket of Bath and Bodyworks items to help pay for awards and incentives. The winner was drawn at Mid-Winter Conference in January, where Shay joked that she couldn't wait to announce the winner so she didn't have to carry that large (and heavy) basket home, but as luck would have it the winner was in her own Unit, and not present, so Shay happily took it home to Barbara Stykes!

In keeping with the Auxiliary's theme of Recruit, Retain, Renew, the Membership Committee switched that up a little this year to Retain, Renew, Recruit. While the goal is always new members, Shay felt it was incredibly important to have a hard focus on RETENTION. So many Units are losing members due to conflict, lack of enthusiasm, communication problems, etc. Many ideas were shared throughout the year by the Units who implemented phone calls and cards to members they haven't heard from or seen in a while, newsletters with a spotlight on a different member each month, asking members to stand up at a Unit meeting and tell the members a little about themselves, and other ways to keep our members engaged and motivated. The Department also focused on getting the zero Units back in business. Division Presidents were tasked with reaching out to each of their zero Units to provide assistance. Happily, the Department of Texas went from 18 zero Units to 5 at the time of this writing! Way to go Division & District Presidents! Additionally, five new Units were chartered this year and have been very enthusiastic to work the programs.

In keeping with President Sharon's theme, the "Butterfly Effect Transformation Story" was an opportunity for members to tell us of their 'transformation' in the Auxiliary. We all started out in that cocoon stage, - not sure what all these terms meant, "how long can one meeting last?", and reluctant to vote or ask questions.... soon moving upward to the eventual beautiful butterfly who is knowledgeable, confident, attending conventions, and running for office. The committee received quite a few stories and will have a prize for the most motivational and inspiring story.

Communication continued to be an issue but with the visual revision of the emails and reports, many members noted that they were more appealing and easier to read. The committee held several zoom meetings together to discuss ways to help the Units who were struggling and keep everyone motivated. Another incentive concept was to divide the Units into small, medium, and large based on the number of members – the Unit in each group that reached the highest membership percentage would receive a plaque.

Shay has expressed that this opportunity was, once again, a learning experience showing that we can never stop reaching out for more knowledge, training, and resources. Though Texas has not quite reached the 100% goal by this writing, Shay is confident that it can be done! She is grateful for the amazing Units who kept the fires burning by sharing the word of the ALA through branding, community events, and so much more. She is also grateful to the members of this committee who came with so many ideas, actions, and communication within their division – but most importantly, they worked together as a team to get the job done. NATIONAL SECURITY Marty Peters - Chairman

Texas Department National Security Chairman is both inspired and challenged by the amazing unit National Security reports received from the Texas units. Chairman Peters is impressed by the efforts put forth by the units to support the military, their families and the first responders and she is challenged to convey adequately the full measure of the unit members' dedication to this program. During the Department Executive Committee meeting, a program fair with booths for every program was presented. National Security provided information on all aspects of the program including photographs, a Blue-Star banner, a miniature POW/MIA table, sample proclamations, quilts of valor, and other ideas.

The Department of Texas continued the use of Poppy Funds to support military families again this year donating \$5,000.00 to the Armed Services YMCA for military stationed in Killeen Fort Cavazos and \$5,000.00 to TAPS specifically targeted towards children of active-duty military families.

In a joint effort with the Detachment of Texas Sons of the American Legion, the Texas American Legion Auxiliary participated in both the Backpacks and School Supplies distribution with the ASYMCA and in again by providing the turkey or ham for the Holiday meal distribution effort.

Three Texas Department meetings provided opportunities for units to bring School Supplies; Paper products; and Personal Hygiene products to be delivered to the ASYMCA in Killeen to serve the military families at Camp Cavazos.

This report will highlight four units that reported outstanding activities in the National Security Program this administrative year.

In Benbrook, Texas, Paul Mansir Unit 297 is located near Naval Air Station Joint Reserve Base Fort Worth. They have established a relationship that provides frequent and regular opportunities to interact with the military and their families through the Family Readiness Group. Their report details their unique and innovating ideas including crafts, food, and activities for: Month of the military child Armed Forces Day

Marshall-Scott Jamar ALA Unit 61 in Abilene, Texas, participated in a Block Party for the Military Child at the Youth Center at Dyess Air Force Base. They hosted a carnival game: "Drop the Disc" (like Plinko). The children dropped a disc and received a prize including paddleballs, puzzles, pens, notebooks, bubbles, pencils, yo-yos, necklaces and bracelets, patriotic bookmarks and stuffed animals. The table was visited 260 times.

Unit 521 in Pasadena, Texas, promoted Military Kids Day in conjunction with American Legion Family Day. 212 Children received flyers through the Pasadena Independent School District inviting them to attend the Post home celebration. Each child received a certificate; played games enjoyed hot dogs, snow cones, popcorn and McDonald pies. Additionally, Wal-Mart provided a \$10 gift card and Golden Corral gave a free meal and drink coupon. Door prizes were given away throughout the event. Ten members worked 25 hours as the Unit spent \$200 and in-kind donations totaled \$2,500.00. This report wishes to recognize the great idea to combine these two activities. This unit also displays the current year POW/MIA poster in the activity and meeting room which is free for the asking from the government.

Located over 150 miles from the nearest military base, Woods W. Lynch Unit 19 in Midland, Texas has found ways to work the National Security program and support the military regardless of the distance. This unit has a strong presence on their face book page and keeps National Security information frequently posted. Their unit members wear red on Fridays, they wear Be the One shirts, and they are branded at all their functions and in their action activity photographs. Their various

National Security program donations exceed Twelve thousand dollars as they additionally donate in-kind and sponsor many fund-raising activities and events for scholarships and other ways to support military families. This chairman commends Unit 19 for their innovative ideas and continued efforts to work the National Security program.

It came to this chairman's attention that Texas units participated in "10,000 cards to the Troops" prior to the Christmas season. Units 511 Dallas, Unit 597 in Carrollton, were two units that reported participating in this activity.

It is reported that proclamations were issued and presented to several Texas Units for National Security activities by City, County and State entities.

Texas is proud to have 15 active-duty military installations within the Lone Star State and an estimated 111,061 personnel from the Army, Air Force, Navy,

Marines and Space Force as well as the National Guard and Reserve. With a current membership of 12,633, each ALA member in Texas can serve eight activeduty military sometime during the year so that every serviceperson stationed in Texas is touched by the American Legion Auxiliary somewhere, sometime by someone.

This Chairman wishes more than twenty units had provided reports to more accurately convey the great work performed in the National Security program by Texas dedicated and hard-working ALA volunteers. It is likely that these reports may reflect only one tenth of the National Security program efforts actually performed in Texas.



PAST PRESIDENT'S PARLEY Teresa Copeland - Chairman

The Presidents Parley is a committee made up of Past Department Presidents. It was established to share the knowledge and the experience of past American Legion Auxiliary leaders with all members.

The primary purpose and goal of this year's committee, was mentoring, training and fundraising for medical scholarships. The committee also encouraged Units to nominate outstanding members for Unit Member of the Year, a prestigious award which includes an invitation to the Unit Member of the Year luncheon held

annually at the National Convention. The committee also asked former leaders to give back, to stay active and to continue their service to the organization through mentoring.

Each year the Past Presidents Parley committee awards \$1000.00 medical scholarships to deserving Texas students who wish to continue their education. With this in mind, the committee immediately began working on their goal to raise enough money through donations and fundraisers, so that all applicants could receive a scholarship.

During the DEC meeting held in September, the PPP Committee participated in the "KALEIDOSCOPE OF COLOR." Dressed in butterfly covered nurses'

uniforms and butterfly wings, the committee decorated a table, printed out "Donation Request" template letters, gave away candy and writing pens that looked like hypodermic needles, all while quizzing members on their PPP knowledge. They also sold raffle tickets for a large Flag afghan to raise money for the scholarships. It was a lot of fun!

During the Midwinter Conference in January, hoping to raise more money, the committee continued to sell raffle tickets for the Flag Afghan along with a raffle for a Kureig Coffee Maker. Both prizes were given away at the conference.

During the year, the PPP Committee put information in the Department bulletin and sent out mass emails, reminding District Presidents to include Past Department, District and Division Presidents in their District conventions. They also put out a Christmas challenge for Units, Districts or individuals to donate a minimum of \$100 before Christmas day to be placed in a drawing for a \$50 gift card.

As of the cut-off date for medical scholarships applications, May 1st, enough funds had been raised that all applicants would receive a scholarship.



POPPY Janíe Arísta - Chaírman

The Poppy Program is an amazing program that helps our veterans and their families. Units were busy throughout the state of Texas, setting up displays, making poppies out of felt, crepe paper and even yarn. We received 14-unit yearend reports. We also received one poppy poster which won locally and was forwarded to southern division and then sent to national.

Let's take a trip around Texas and see what has been going on throughout the year. Here's what they were doing! Some units were written up in the local newspaper and one unit was on the local news station where the audience learned about the importance of the Poppy Program and how the donations collected from poppies helped veterans and their families.

A lot of units were busy around Memorial Day, Veterans Day, Valentines Day and any other holiday that can honor veterans. There were dinners, parades, air shows, even Easter egg hunts and Family Day where the poppy program was visible and poppy color books were available. Poppies were handed out to the veterans at hospitals and senior citizen homes. Local stores often had booths set up with unit members setting up poppy information as well as displaying a table full of poppies. One unit got a new member when they were set up at a local store. One unit asked a few veterans to sit with them when they distributed poppies; the unit members believed it made it easier for those from the community who approached the table to visit, share stories and remember their loved ones (veterans) who passed.

One unit reached out to the community to help make poppies. Girl Scouts volunteered to help and when the project was complete, they received a badge from the Girl Scouts.

Many units set out poppy cans in the Post where they were available throughout the year for collecting donations. A unit entered the annual chili cook off and included raising funds for cancer research; they wanted to promote both programs. ROTC visitors were in attendance with the unit members.

Units used social media (especially Facebook) to get the word out about poppies and the Poppy Program, promoting who we are, what we do and why we matter.

A unit set up for a bicycle run and handed out lapel pins of flags and poppies when they stopped at the unit's canopy to be refreshed.

There were a lot of poppy parties and paint and sip parties. It was a great time to get better acquainted with unit members and to make new friends. The junior members were involved with distributing poppies. Some handed out poppy stickers at the grand opening of the Medal of Honor Museum.

Many creative ways were shared on how to promote the poppy program--yard stakes for a poppy memorial garden, a poppy table with veteran thank you cards, posters with the poppy story and the "In Flanders Fields" poem, poppy cupcakes and cookies, Lolli Poppies, poppy coloring books with crayons and poppy donation cans. Poppy Day seemed to be every day all year long! Thank you to all the unit members who dedicated their time to promote and educate others about the Poppy Program.



PUBLIC RELATIONS Místy Jeffcoat - Chaírman

The American Legion Auxiliary Units across the Department of Texas have actively and creatively promoted the mission, programs, and accomplishments of our organization throughout the year. Their commitment to public relations has strengthened community connections and increased visibility for the Auxiliary's initiatives.

Abilene Unit 61 led the way as the first to submit its Public Relations narrative this year, setting an inspiring example for other Units. Many Units successfully built relationships with local media outlets-including newspapers, television stations, and radio-to share news, promote events, and announce meetings. Notable examples include Weatherford Unit 163, Abilene Unit 61, Hallettsville Unit 230, La Grange Unit 102, Madisonville Unit 84, Midland Unit 19, and Moulton Unit 302, all of which utilized local newspapers for press releases and event promotion.

Further expanding their media presence, Units such as Abilene Unit 61, Hallettsville Unit 230, Madisonville Unit 84, Dallas Wynnewood Unit 511, and Midland Unit 19 shared the mission of the American Legion Auxiliary via radio broadcasts, television appearances, and podcasts.

Social media has become a cornerstone of Auxiliary outreach efforts. Platforms including Facebook, Instagram, Twitter/X, and official Unit websites have been widely used to promote meetings, share photos and videos from events, and engage with the public through live content. Units that demonstrated exceptional use of social media include San Leon Unit 291, Conroe Unit 411 (a newly chartered Unit as of September 2024), Dallas Units 511 and 424, Midland Unit 19, The Woodlands Unit 305, Benbrook Unit 297, and Carrollton Unit 597. These Units consistently posted content, created event flyers and newsletters, published calendars, and effectively used Facebook Events to raise awareness.

Public-facing events have also played a major role in public relations. Many Units hosted community events such as vendor fairs, Easter egg hunts, and "Breakfast with Santa" gatherings. These events provided opportunities to distribute information about the American Legion Auxiliary and recruit eligible individuals. Carrollton Unit 597 created a professionally designed rack card featuring information about their Legion Family and eligibility requirements to join the American Legion. These rack cards are distributed to Post visitors and at community events, helping increase awareness and interest in membership.

Outreach extended into schools, where Units distributed *Star Spangled Kids* kits and shared messages of citizenship, kindness, and academic encouragement. Dallas Unit 511 spoke with students about good deeds, while Willis Unit 200 presented a scholarship during a school awards program.

To ensure visibility in the community, members proudly wore branded apparel, ALA pins, and identification badges during events. Some Units, such as Madisonville Unit 84, Wallis Unit 200, and Benbrook Unit 297, enhanced their community engagement by joining their local Chambers of Commerce, yielding valuable promotional opportunities. Carrollton Unit 597 was presented with a proclamation for the Month of the Military Child by the Mayor at a City Council Meeting.

Dallas Wynnewood Unit 511 formed partnerships with other community organizations, presenting thank-you plaques in recognition of support and hosting a Legion Family Play Day, open to the public. Midland Unit 19 collaborated with other Posts and Units on larger community events, demonstrating the power of teamwork within the Legion Family.

Participation in local parades and community festivals was widespread. Dallas Unit 424 made a strong impression with a booth at a major Irish Festival, inviting other local Units to join them.

They took the opportunity to speak with festival goers about the Legion Family and encourage visits to nearby Posts. Both Dallas Unit 424 and Carrollton Unit 597 creatively engaged the public through the "Adopt a Duck" program, drawing attention to their booths and opening conversations about ALA and Legion programs.

Benbrook Unit 297 hosted several events at the Naval Air Station Joint Reserve Base, inviting members of the military and local residents to learn more about the Auxiliary. Abilene Unit 61 proudly presented the colors at a Special Olympics event, while Weatherford Unit 163 distributed free Veterans Day meal vouchers from Texas Roadhouse to local veterans.

In summary, the Units of the Department of Texas have demonstrated outstanding dedication and innovation in promoting the mission of the American Legion Auxiliary. Their efforts have elevated the visibility of our programs, strengthened community ties, and furthered the goals of *Service Not Self.*



VETERANS AFFAIRS AND REHABILITATION MaryAnn Paul - Chairman

The purpose of the VA & R program is to promote programs and services that assist and enhance the lives of veterans and their families, ensuring and/or transition to normal operational lives.

We strongly believe in rehabilitation and healing through arts/crafts and music therefore the Department of Texas is a major contributor to the National Veterans Creative Arts Festival making an annual donation of \$7,868.00. Units hosted painting parties to aid healing through arts, crafts and hobbies. Many units also purchased art supplies needed by veterans.

Fourteen VA Medical Centers and/or Clinics are staffed with 22 Representatives and Deputies (and we are in the process of recruiting several additional Reps & Deps). Some are there daily with coffee carts and snacks. Every holiday you will find our Reps & Deps and Unit members serving up special treats. Whether it be cupcakes, ice cream or lap blankets. Our ALA members host pizza parties & bingo. Christmas Gift shops are also held at several of the VA Medical Centers. Every veteran hospitalized during Christmas receives a small monetary gift and/or item. We make sure no veteran at a VA Medical Center during Christmas goes without a Christmas gift. For Christmas, members of ALA Unit 411 brought all the supplies needed for a Christmas Feast at Camp Valor, a residential treatment center for veterans and first responders with PTSD.

ALA members also take homecooked meals to our Fisher Houses. They make sure that the houses are supplied with dish soap, laundry soap, paper products and groceries. Unit 19 Midland donated \$500.00 to the Fisher House in El Paso. Unit 19 partnered with Meals on Wheels, with over 80 veterans in their programs, donating 27 fans, 52 heaters, 28 wheelchairs and delivering meals. Our Meals on Wheels veterans are not forgotten at Christmas; Units 96 & 110 make sure their wish lists are fulfilled. A member from Unit 61 Abilene attended a "We Honor Vets" meeting to discuss the meal program to open to all veterans in July.

Many units partner with Wreaths Across America ensuring that most veteran graves have a wreath at Christmas, this includes private and national cemeteries. Standdowns are held throughout the State. Distributing socks, underwear, thermals, coats, and misc. personal hygiene items. Unit 802 Dallas has their annual "Socks for Veterans" with thousands of socks collected and taken to our VA Medical Centers.

We support The American Legion's "BE THE ONE" program to destigmatize asking for mental health support, encouraging peer-to-peer support and resources and educating everyone on how they can help prevent veteran and military suicide. We had several members in our department complete the training. Member's wear "BE THE ONE" shirts and post awareness information on Facebook. District 4 held a joint "BE THE ONE" training at their Spring Convention.

Units work with the West Texas VA Homeless Program and local agencies to help veterans with rent, groceries, utilities, transportation, dental work, and funeral expenses, among others. \$6,000 was raised by Unit 19 Midland for their Post 19 Veterans Assistance Fund. Units hosted community events "Veterans Night Out" dinner and dance, "Real American Idols" Veteran Karaoke contest, Veteran Chili Cook Off, and American Legion Family Days.

Contest, Veteran Chili Cookoff and four different American Legion Family days. Monies were raised and donated to "We Are Not Forgotten" women's veteran organization to sponsor a retreat. Members were active with the Texas Patriot Guard Riders, offering an escort and flag line for veteran funeral services. Unit 19 had 6 members serving as volunteers on the Permian Bason Honor Flight.

Unit 33 Beaumont donated ten laundry baskets full of kitchen items for homeless veterans for their new apartments, along with clothing.

Every Thursday (50 times a year) from 8:00-10:00 A.M. approximately 100 veterans and their caretakers/spouses come to the Earl Graham 159 American Legion Post where coffee, donuts and kolaches are served by the Auxiliary members. Attendance continues to grow as the veterans find comfort and friendship at this event. Approximately 14 doz. of donuts are eaten, and 495 cups of coffee are consumed every Thursday. A grant from Brazos Valley Cares helps support this event.

Unit 164 Katy sponsors "Pies for Hope" to raise awareness for Camp Hope (a PTSD Foundation) and provided 125 pies for their Thanksgiving meal plus a cash donation of \$500. Unit 164 Katy's Women Veterans Day is an annual event under the leadership of our dual members recognizing our Women Veterans. They celebrate their service through their stories and this year our keynote speaker was 105-year-old dual member Thelma Williams.

The Department of Texas is proud to report that many of our unit members purchased Challenge Cards from our National Organization that benefit the Veterans Projects Fund.

Unit 297 Bedford has been working with the Patriot House and Liberty House for many years. These transitional living facilities provide counseling, social & life skills training, and other services to help veterans who lack permanent housing to reintegrate back into the workforce and provide a stable home for themselves. We deliver monthly donations of household items, food, linens, holiday favors, and more. The residents are always happy to see us, and it is incredibly heart-warming to feel their happiness for the little things we are blessed to do for them.

March 29th is National VietNam Veterans Day; Unit 297 Bedford held a special event at the Naval Air Station Joint Reserve Base (NASJRB) where local VietNam veterans were honored for their service during the VietNam War. The Base Commander gave each veteran a commemorative pin and special gift. Of course, we had cake! That evening we sponsored a special meat loaf dinner to honor our VietNam veterans at Post 297 as well.

The Department of Texas VA & R Facebook page has daily activies posted. We are happy to report that our unit members take to heart our mission in assisting our veterans and their families every day.



WAYS AND MEANS Cathy Perry - Chairman

President Sharon's pin is a rectangular pin, with a white background and gold border. The state of Texas is in the middle of the pin, divided into three parts in red, white and blue. The lone star in white in the blue really stands out. A beautiful purple butterfly covers the white part of Texas. In the top left corner, written in gold, is our new American Legion Auxiliary emblem. Going across the bottom part of Texas is Sharon's theme "Advocating for Change, One Veteran at a Time" written in gold; below that is her name, ALA Dept. of Texas and her term 2024-2025, all in gold. To go with Sharon's theme this year, is her membership theme, "Transforming Lives Through Our Membership".

Sharon's pins are \$4.00 each. At Department Convention last year, several hundred pins were held on consignment. This is something that has been done for many years. It enables Division, District and Unit presidents to take the pins back home to the groups / individuals that are unable to come to conventions. The Division, District, and Unit Presidents can use these pins for awards, incentives or just to sell back.



BIG SPRINGS VA MEDICAL CENTER Shawna Dunlap - Representative

The George H. O'Brien, Jr., Department of Veterans Affairs Medical Center in Big Spring is part of the West Texas VA Health Care System, which also includes a West Texas VA Homeless Veteran program, the Midland Vet Center and the Wilson and Young Medal of Honor VA Clinic in between Midland and Odessa.

The VA Hospital provides primary care and specialty health services, including mental health services, treatment for spinal cord injuries and traumatic brain injury, suicide prevention, women's health care, dental/oral surgery, audiology, caregiver support, and more. They currently support around 26 patients in the main hospital and around 30 residents in their new Community Living Center for rehabilitation from addiction, depression treatment, community re-entry from incarceration, job training, life skills development and education.

The VA Clinic offers primary care and specialty health services, including mental health care, physical and occupational therapy, treatment for addiction and substance abuse, women's health services and more. We are working on getting a monthly snack and information station in partnership with Midland Unit 19 and Odessa Unit 430.

The Midland Vet Center offers confidential help for Veterans, service members, and their families at no cost in a non-medical setting. Their services include counseling for needs such as depression, post-traumatic stress disorder, and the psychological effects of military sexual trauma. The West Texas VA Homeless Veteran program is based out of San Angelo. Both of these organizations contact me or officers of Unit 19 in Midland when they have a veteran in need of assistance with food, rent, utilities, clothes, gas, etc.

Partnering with Unit 19 in Midland, we made several trips to Big Spring to the VA Hospital to deliver snacks and soft drinks for the residents. At Christmas, Unit 19 donated piles of Christmas gifts, clothing, socks, 26 Old Spice gifts sets, 20 3-in-1 body wash, shampoo and conditioner, games, snacks and soft drinks. All 46 patients and residents at the VA Hospital got a \$10 Gift Card from Unit 19. For Valentine's for Veterans, we delivered cookies, boxes of chocolates, and bags of gummie bears, along with cards from local school kids given to the veterans by Little Miss Poppy Aspynn Beeson with a hug. Unit 19 members gave all veterans a Thank You Card with a Poppy attached to the cookie bags.

We are currently recruiting 2 Hospital Deputies to the program, with the intent that one of them will move up to the Representative position should it become necessary.



DALLAS VA MEDICAL CENTER Theresa Hill - Representative

Theresa accepted the responsibility of being Hospital Representative at the Dallas VAMC along with her Deputy Evelyn Lopez, she reported this has been a very eventful year.

For the year 2024-2025 Theresa reported ALA was able to help Chemotherapy patients, we were able to give handmade tote bags filled with blankets, handmade pillows/caps, snacks and word fine books. Also provided a beautiful Chemo bell for the clinic to have for patients to ring and celebrate them completing there last day of chemotherapy.

This year the ALA has continued to support the Poly Trauma area by providing juices and snacks for all patients. Some of our amputees and Traumatic brain injuries Veterans are there most of the day with little funds, the snacks made a difference for these Veterans and family members.

Theresa's Deputy Evelyn delivers comfort items to 5th floor as well as the 7th floor to patients.

ALA was able to deliver to 3 out of 4 of our ICU areas comfort items Toothpaste, toothbrushes, deodorants, combs and razors. Comfort items are provided for the mammography area with soothing music as well as bottled water and snacks.

ALA supported the Breast Cancer Awareness month providing cookies, cupcakes, punch along with pink beads and stickers.

This year ALA participated in National Salute three full days hosting events and distributing over 400 boxes of chocolates, cupcakes, cookies and snack items for Veterans.

American Legion Riders were allowed to show 4 motorcycles in the Atrium of the hospital. Veterans enjoyed their time admiring the bikes and chatting with riders.

ALA supported the POW program with cakes, punch, plates and napkins to help make the event successful.

ALA supports the CLC year-round with decorations and snacks for inpatient events.

This year the Our Pre-Veterans Days celebration was held giving out 1,000 hot dogs chips drinks and pies. ALA provided all pies.

The ALA was able to host the ALA Gift Shop by providing gifts for our Veterans families wrapped and mailed to their family address this year.

Theresa reported donations were made from several Units of socks and underwear to be distributed to in-patients along with lotions.

ALA participated with the **Packing of Bags** at the Dallas VA- for our Veteran inpatients. Provided canteen books for the event. This year a Junior ALA member and her school assisted with the event and provided so much help in the delivery and assembly of bags.

Theresa attended the monthly VAVS Executive Committee meetings held every first Monday of the month. Theresa and Evelyn attend VAVS Quarterly meetings. Theresa reported she provided/stocked her Auxiliary Kiddie Kart to deliver coloring books and snacks to children in the Clinical waiting rooms at the hospital (All items donated by Auxiliary Unit members).

This lovely hospital is actually no longer a hospital and has only been a clinic, with long term memory care, palliative, hospice and geriatric long-term care. The clinic side has 7 primary teams that do outpatient care.

This past year the American Legion Auxiliary was able to conduct in person visits. The ALA hosted bingo once a month, took first place, again, in the most money raised at the annual car show event. The fundraising for the Auxiliary was for bake goods. The annual Veterans Christmas tree again brought an amazing turn out and no angel was left on the tree, sounds like the movie where we should ring a bell for all the angels that go their wings. The annual easter egg hunt for the family members of the AMAZING nurses and in patient clients did not see as great a turn out as our stuffing 2000 eggs warranted, BUT it was all due to lack of communication from our exhausted nurses so we TOTALLY forgave them for that.

The long-term care side houses 154 beds, but has not seen full capacity for a few years. The inpatient clients always enjoy the delivery of Halloween candy, visits and gifts from the Auxiliary. Then there are cookies at Christmas, with gifts from Santa, of course. Easter is the egg hunt, with fruit and cookie trays. Veterans' days are cards from children around the 221st district and visits from the Auxiliary. Let us not forget Valentines Day with lots of hugs and kisses, chocolate of course and again cards from kiddos and local auxiliary units.

The Auxiliary also participated in salute to Veteran's week in February with coffee, snacks, cards and goodies for those coming in and out of appointments. So even though Kerrville is small we have a lot of fun with the Veterans and very good working relationship with the staff.



WACO VA MEDICAL CENTER Mary Hueske - Representative

Mary Hueske, Representative and deputies Tone Mahon, and Ruth Beers continued to serve the Veterans at the Waco VA campus with activities and treats. But it is with great sadness that they reported that the Waco VA has lost a 30-year volunteer with the passing of deputy Hilde Neumann, she is truly missed. This year they had 18 occasional Volunteers, with 81 volunteer hours. Included in the occasional volunteers was a SAL member.

They attended all the VAVS quarterly meetings, and they made it their goal to help Volunteer Services every chance they could. They helped on all the joint VSO activities, July 4th, Halloween, Veterans Day, Salute to Veterans, Thanksgiving and Christmas, etc....

Every month, they hold 7 Ice Cream Socials, and 2 Bingo parties. They also have a "Greeters" program on the Medical Bldg, greeting all the Veterans coming in for lab work and doctor appointments. They hand out free items, cold water and a snack. Some of the items they hand out are activities kits from the "Help Heal Veterans" Org. They have information packets on hand to tell the Veterans about the American Legion and Auxiliary. They love it, and get to tell them thank you for what they have done for them.

They have traveled over 4,126 miles and received approx. \$24,427.21 in donations for the Waco VA and the homeless Veterans in the Waco area. The donations they received were way too numerous to list, but here is some of the things donated this year: One Unit gave \$7,000.00 to support the Homeless Veterans program; another Unit has given 370 Non-perishable lunches valued at \$1,383.29 for the homeless program, and a Unit is sponsoring a 100-gallon fish aquarium in the relaxation room in the RISE Unit, paying for the food and cleaning of the tank.

They have received \$1,069.00 in donations, designated for the women's RISE Unit to purchase anything they may need, and there was so much more.

For the Veterans Christmas Gift Bags this year, they reached out to the District, Units and Post asking for donations for the Veterans gifts. They received donations totaling \$570.00 which were used to purchase hats, puzzle books, combs, and blankets for the Veterans Christmas gifts. These items were added to the donations from the other VSO Groups.

They held their second annual Gift Shop in 2024 and are now working on next year's Gift Shop. The gift shop event was attended by the Department President Sharon Phelps and 2nd Division President Licia Kim, and members from Unit 159 and Unit 84. After the event, it was so wonderful to hear everyone saying they couldn't wait till next year. In 2024 they handed out the \$10.00 Christmas Assessment in person.

Mary said they know they make a huge impact on the Veterans they come into contact with every day. Here are a couple of those times. 1) While doing an ice cream social they noticed a woman veteran in the Women's Lockward that was sitting by herself, not smiling, and definitely sad. They took her a bowl of ice cream and spoke briefly. A few minutes later she came up to them and said she was having the worst day and their kindness, smile and wonderful treat has made her day better. When she went back to sit down, she was smiling! 2) While delivering Non-perishable lunches for the homeless program, they were told that there were 3 veterans that come every day to get a non-perishable lunch and then ask for one to take with them when they leave. The staff told them; these lunches are the only thing these Veterans have to eat all day. 3) And then there was the veteran in the Men's Lockward that colored a beautiful drawing and made an Origami bird and asked if he could give these to them as a thank you for cheering up his day. They all love working with the Veterans and appreciate all the help they get, to be able to do the things they do.

The only exception is if the Finance Chair becomes incapacitated, and no one on the Finance Committee meets the Chairman requirements, (two consecutive years'experience) in this instance, the President must do their due diligence to fill this position with a qualified member, excluding the elected Treasurer." The motion carried.

Constitutions & Bylaws Chairman on behalf of the committee moved to approve the proposed change to Standing Rules of the American Legion Auxiliary, Department of Texas Section V. MEMBERSHIP DUES, #2 to read "For Senior members, Units shall remit to Department Headquarters the annual Department per capita dues of thirteen dollars (\$13.00) plus the annual National per capita dues of eighteen dollars (18.00), a total of \$31.00. 3. For Junior members, Units shall remit to Department Headquarters the annual Department per capita dues of two dollars and fifty cents (\$2.50) plus the annual National per capita dues of two dollars and fifty cents (\$2.50), a total of five dollars. 4. From the thirteen dollars transmitted to the Department, eighty cents (\$.80) shall be transferred to the Department Veterans Affairs and Rehabilitation Fund. A minimum of ten cents (\$.10) of every paid Senior membership shall be transferred into the Department of Texas Future National Officer Leadership Development Fund to help finance the candidacy of a Texas member seeking a National Office. 5. The membership dues for Senior members who join the Department Headquarters Unit shall be forty-five dollars (\$45.00) per member, and dues for Junior members shall be fifteen dollars (\$15.00) per member. Both shall be paid annually. 6. Any amendments regarding dues shall be by action of the Department Convention delegates." The motion carried.

Constitutions & Bylaws Chairman on behalf of the committee moved to approve the proposed change to Standing Rules of the American Legion Auxiliary Department of Texas Article VIII section 1 to read "As provided in the Department Bylaws, there shall be the following Core Standing Committees: Americanism, Children and Youth, Constitution & Bylaws, Finance, Membership, National Security, and Veterans Affairs and Rehabilitation. There shall be the following Mission Outreach Committees: Community Service, Education, Girls State, Junior Activities, Legislative, and Poppy. In addition, there shall be the following Member/Organizational Support Committees: Auxiliary Emergency Fund, Leadership, and Public Relations. There shall also be the following Special Purpose Committees: Cancer Research, Past Presidents Parley and any other ad hoc/ Special Purpose Committees the incoming President deems necessary." Constitutions & Bylaws Chairman on behalf of the committee moved to approve the proposed change to Article VIII. DEPARTMENT COMMITTEES Section 4 a. to read "Article VIII. DEPARTMENT COMMITTEES Section 4 a. No Department Officer or Committee Chair or Committee member shall hold more than one Department Office or Committee Chair or Committee member appointment at the same time except that of those serving as; 1) Hospital Representatives and Deputies; 2) Special purpose committees that perform special tasks; 3) The National Executive Committee person shall be allowed to serve on a committee as deemed desirable by the incoming Department President. 4) The elected Department Treasurer shall automatically be appointed as the member at large of the Department Finance Committee, with one stipulation, they may not serve as Chair.
